Dear Sir:

I received your reply of Sept. 22nd., to my letter of August 24th., and will give you as much information as I can in regard to the matter.

My number was 5699, I was a Private in the Royal Newfoundland Regt. I enlisted at St. John's, Newfoundland on June 17th., 1918#. I served Overseas and was discharged on account of Demobilization, after one year and 52 days with the Colours, on August 7, 1919.

When I enlisted I was in B. Co. We were sent across and had a camp near Winchester. Possibly the place might have been a part of Winchester.

I was taken sick with the flu and was in the hospital there. B. Company was sent to France. I got better and had a relapse before I left the hospital. I was in the hospital three or four weeks.

It seems queer to me that there is no record of my hospitalization. It seems that there should be a record of it somewhere.

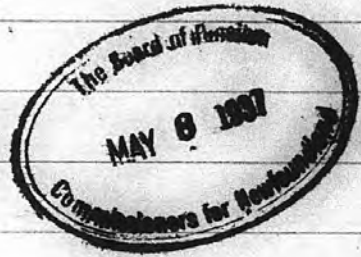

Dear Sir,

I received your letter of March 12th
It seems to me that you have not found my record.
I am going to state here the facts.

My number was 5699. I was in a draft for
France. The same night of my draft I was taken
sick with the flu and was carried unconscious to
the hospital

I was sick three or four days and the Doctors
let me out then I had the relapse and was
sick around four weeks.

The Doctor said, that one out of a hundred ever
survived after being so bad off as I was.

I think you must of found my Cousin G. Gaudet
record who enlisted the same day and place
that I did instead of mine.

After I was discharged from the army
I was supposed to get monthly payments but
I did not get mine until I had papers
filled out in St. Johns.

I think you have made a mistake and will
you kindly trace my record.

If I was not disabled by having the flu.
I would not even try for a pension.

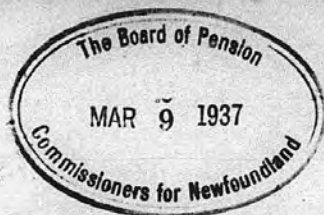
