The above mentioned officer has received the British War Medal from this Office, for having left his place of residence and proceeded overseas on duty. He is not entitled to the Victory Medal for Military service as he had not entered a theatre of war as defined by Army Orders.

However, he was placed in charge of drafts of drafts of Naval Reservists on one or two occasions, from Newfoundland to points in England, and was under Naval Orders during the periods of transports. He is of opinion that having passed four or more times through the war zone at sea on naval duty that he is entitled to the Victory Medal from the Admiralty. advice and told him he had better go home for the night. He said
it would take him a couple of days to fix up for duty.

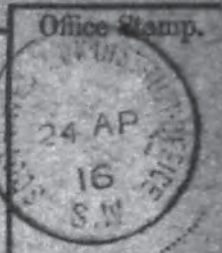

The above mentioned officer has received the British War Medal from this Office, for having left his place of residence and proceeded overseas on duty. He is not entitled to the Victory Medal for Military service as he had not entered a theatre of war as defined by Army Orders.

However, he was placed in charge of drafts of Naval Reservists on one or two occasions, from Newfoundland to points in England, and was under Naval Orders during the periods of transports. He is of opinion that having passed four or more times through the war zone at sea on naval duty that he is entitled to the Victory Medal from the Admiralty. The record of his service under Admiralty Orders would be with Naval records, and no records of such service is on file in this office.

Will you please place his claim before the proper person at the Admiralty,

Application was made to the Accountant General of the Navy, Medal Branch, for the award of the Victory Medal to Captain Goodridge, and a reply has now been received to the effect that this Officer is not entitled to the Naval award of the Victory Medal.
