All casualties in the Newfoundland Contingent, however, are sent by this Office to the War Office for publication and are issued in a publication periodical which may be obtained through a stationer or direct from the War Office. These are also published in the leading newspapers.

The recent statements in the press regarding The Royal Newfoundland Regiment appear to be somewhat misleading, and casualties have not been reported to this Office of such a nature as would suggest that it had been

in heavy fighting.

Some 10,000 letters etc. reached this Office yesterday from Newfoundland. They bore postmarks about 20th to 25th February. It is hoped you will receive your mail. Mails have been very slow in coming from Newfoundland recently.
