Dear Sir William,

Major Cluny Macpherson did excellent work for us while he was here. He was much concerned in the development of the helmet against gas poisoning from its Navy pattern to its present type. His suggestion at one period of this development was of very great assistance. He got to know of our gas protection and the course of developments in that work, too, and we sent him to the Dardanelles, where he was of the greatest use in giving lectures upon anti-gas measures. I think he was quite good in finding his way through the official organizations, with which, of course, civilians are unacquainted, and he required far less grandmothering than is the rule. I think he is an excellent officer -- sensible, business-like, and "out" for efficiency. Of course, as he came here as the senior officer of Newfoundland, I endeavoured to use him in some position of responsibility. I shall be glad to have him back as an

ordinary doctor for duty with troops in medical and surgical work, if he can be spared. I quite agree with you that Macpherson is worthy of being included in any honours-list you are sending in.

My Dear Sir Walter:

This bade fair to be a very dreary Christmas for me but there turned out to be many alleviating circumstances.

= Muxes When I got ashore here it was too late to get to the hospital at which I was quartered before leaving for England so I went to my friends of No.1 Canadian Stationary Hospital and asked them to put me up for the night which they did. That was Christmas Eve. I found that Nurse Parsons was one of the nurses in this Hospital and had the pleasure of turning her over a parcel that her brother had given me for her in London. From her I found that a large detachment of our regiment was quartered just next to the Hospital, and that Captain O'Brien and Lieut. Shortall were in No.3 Canadian Stationary Hospital which adjoins No.1 on the other side. So as I was right in the midst of Newfoundlanders I was glad to be able to arrange with my Canadian friends to be attached for quarters and rations while here.

Christmas Morning I set out bright and early for our lines and soon found the boys. They were the party who were in reserve at the time of the evacuation most of them having some little ailment, mostly frostbite, not serious enough to take them to Hospital. The others of the regiment were among those chosen to cover the evacuation, and though they are safely away of course they are not quartered here at present.

I found them all looking exceptionally well. Capt. Alexander was in charge and the following lieutenants were there also:- Nunns, Stick, Taylor, and Summers. I had quite a long chat with them and questioned them with regard to the episodes of which I had heard most complimentary things from English and Australian officers. The exploit in which Donnelly won the

Military Cross and Sgt. Green the D.C.M. you will of course have heard all about: and Headquarters showed their appreciation of the feat by calling the Hill they took "Caribou Hill", and so there is a portion of Gallipoli with a distinctive Newfoundland name among all the Australasian names which commemorate their glorious deeds of our cousins from the Antipodes.

All of the men speak warmly of the heroic death of Fitzgerald, who was a private in No. 3 Division of the St. John Ambulance Brigade before joining the Regiment, and was on the hospital staff at Pleasantville. The following facts I have had from two or three eye-witnesses. Ebsary was shot down a little distance in front of the trenches probably by machine gun fire; Fitzgerald went to his assistance and started to bandage him when he was shot through the leg; he continued to bandage and was again shot through the thigh; he still continued bandaging but called to those in the trench what had happened to him adding that he was all right and could look after Ebsary, which he did until he had finished attending to his injuries. Then he started to step into cover behind a tree till they could get a stretcher for Ebsary when a third bullet hit him in the groin and killed him. "Killed in action" is altogether too meagre a description of such a glorious death as his was, and his comrades feel that it should be commemorated by the V.C. granted posthumously.

Lt.-Col. Burton was also in the same camp but does not know whether he is to be re-attached to our regiment or not. He has quite recovered from his wound. The Regiment is now commanded by Lt.-Col. Hadlow, of whom the boys speak in the highest terms, but he is not here, he is with the other half of the regiment. I showed Col. Burton your letters of which you

sent me a copy, as he had not yet seen them. He has seen in some of the papers which have come from home the charges made in certain quarters about discrimination against Roman Catholics in the matter of commissions. He is very indignant at it and declares that with one or two exceptions he has no knowledge of what sect any of the men belong to.

Several of our men have left for England on the "Aquitania". I saw three as I was coming away, but there were others that I did not get a chance to look up. Those I saw were Marston, W. 327, with Broncho-pneumonia; O'Quinn, Vincent, 1136, with Paratyphoid; Piggott, WZ, 296, Jaundice and slight frostbite of the feet. Yesterday I saw at No.15 Stationary Hospital which is on the other side of the harbour, Nichol, J.435, with Tetanus. He is still on the dangerous list, but is doing as well as can be expected. Capt. Carty is, I am told, in No. 16, but I have not yet had a chance to look him up. Captain^x O'Brien, and Lieut. Shortall are both getting along nicely and are able to walk around; the former has Jaundice, and the latter was shot through the leg but the wound is now healed nicely and though he is a bit stiff on the leg he will soon be O.K. again.

Many thanks for your assurances that Mrs Macpherson and the children are quite well, for I have had a great deal of anxiety on that score owing to letters being lost. I was two months without any news of her, the last news before that being that she had been sent to bed by her physician for a month.

My heartiest wishes to you and Lady Davidson for a Happy New Year, in which May we see Peace once more!

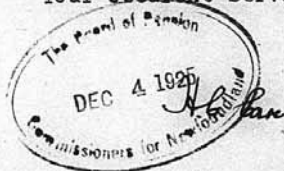

Dear Sir:

I hereby make application for examination, in order that my disability contracted during Military Services may be estimated.

While in Gallipoli I contracted Dysentery, slight, but this went on to Jaundice, for which I was in the Millbank Officers' Hospital, London, about November or December, 1915. I later returned to Mudros and Egypt. While in Egypt I had a fracture-dislocation of the metatarso-phalangeal joint, great toe, left foot, from my horse falling on me, for which I was treated at the No. 1 Australian Stationary Hospital, Ismailia, which has left a partial ankylosis.

From Egypt I proceeded to Salonika, where I was continually troubled with breathlessness, and swelling of ankles.

On reaching London I found that I was to be sent to Roumania, and told the Director-General that I should need to have my heart examined before undertaking that work. He sent me to Sir James McKenzie, who ordered my immediate return home, and that I was not to be sent to the East again. The Medical Board at the War Office confirmed this (October or November, 1916), and invalided me home.

I have certificates from Dr. Frederick Price, Sir James McKenzie's successor, London, as to my condition in 1921, and again this year.

I have been troubled since 1915 with Myocarditis, which prevents me from doing anything involving much exertion. I have been absolutely unable to run, even for one hundred yards, since the War. This has resulted in my having to refuse a great deal of work, which I otherwise could have done, and all out-of-town

work in winter, and practically prohibits my walking any distance if there is snow down.

I have not applied heretofore for a Pension, but the uncertainties of the future make me feel I should at least establish my claim to Pension.

When proceeding across in medical charge of D Company leaving St. John's on March 20th., 1915, I took with me a large bag containing instruments for such emergencies as might arise.

These were all my private property and as they could not be replaced in the local market I have delayed sending in this claim hoping that with the last draft some of them might be returned.

I have made enquiries from all men connected with the Medical Department and as far as I can find they were lost on the way down from Gallipoli.

I did not wish to leave these instruments with the Regiment but Dr. Wakefield urged that I should do so owing to the fact that he had practically no instruments whatever with the Regiment. He promised to forward them to me to London as soon as he could obtain regulation ones to replace them.

I value the bag and the contents at \$100.00 and hope I may be refunded this amount.



Yesterday I visited our boys at Sidi Bishi Camp. No need to tell you of the welcome I got. I brought Donnelly back to lunch with me, and after a feed and a smoke and a little very careful persuading got him to tell me all about the taking of Caribou Hill. Corporal Harold Bassett was his right hand man in the business. He had but eight beside himself, and stood off three determined bombing attacks during the night. Donnelly said that the most nervous time had had over it all was after the place had been consolidated by working parties the next night when the General came to him the next morning and asked him if he thought it was safe for him to go up as he wanted to see the place. Donnelly said "I hated to say No, but leading I was terrified that he'd be caught by a sniper, and that would have been bad."

The General said when he saw the position they had made and defended the night of the taking of the hill, and which Donnelly had planned in a reconnaissance the day before said "I suppose it's from living in the woods that you learned to do a thing like that?" "Yessir" said Donnelly - he says you should always say "Yessir" - though he knows nothing of the woods. (I easily recognized in the plan he laid out for me something of the snowball forts of St John's Streets, though of course I did not mention this to him.) Apropos of the General's remarks he says "You know they all think we Colonials are right out of the woods!"

Bernard he tells me has turned up trumps - "The whitest man in the Regiment" Donnelly says - and as he is O C in his Company "C", he is in a position to know.

Last week Donnelly suddenly found himself senior officer on the troopship going to Mudros with 1,000 troops. So he was O C Troops, and when the Embarkation Officer asked him if he thoroughly understood his duties, he said "Yessir" and off he went, and of course got experience which will always be valuable to him.

As I have been seconded from my Regiment since May I can send you the enclosed without being accused of any self-glorification. I know you will be interested in it. Newfoundland's contribution to the forces of the Empire is so apt to be overlooked first because it is about evenly divided between the Navy and the Army, and secondly because in actual numbers it is small though judged by percentage of population it is large, especially when one takes into account the constant drain which a fishing community suffers. (You will not have forgotten the loss of some 250 men in one large storm of April 1914.) I was interested in the rather apologetic way in which a Morning Post of date somewhere near Christmas acknowledged its tardy discovery of the presence of Newfoundland troops at Suvla. They also took a prominent part in the evacuation of Helles.

Dear Mr Steel-Maitland:

I enclose herewith a copy of a small notice which appeared in "The Times of Egypt" of yesterday's date. I have no idea as to how it got there, but I wish we could get copies of anything else of the sort that may appear in Brigade orders. It is quite probable that there have been more references but, from what I have gathered from several of our officers whom I have seen full justice cannot be done to "Ours" in this way without reflecting rather seriously on other regiments who had failed in some of the 'jobs' which "Ours" have succeeded in. In fact, one of the officers told me yesterday that it was the intention, had they remained longer at Helles to make of them a sort of mobile reserve, of 'dependables' as it were, which could be rushed to any point of danger or giving way at a moment's notice. This, in a division such as they are in, which is the only one the Anzacs have much respect for, speaks volumes.

Two of our officers were M.L.O.s at the evacuation of Helles and left in the last boat. Half of the Regiment were among the rear guard in both evacuations.

With it all they have been most fortunate in the matter of casualties, for Capt. Wighton is still the only officer killed.

tain what is to become of him. He came down on the same steamer with this last detachment, and, being senior officer on board, was O.C. Troops for the voyage.

There is considerable dissatisfaction among the men over many of the commissions granted to men in England who have never been out to the front at all. Many of the privates, even, would have made better officers, in my opinion. I know, of course, the difficulty under which the O.C. Depot labours, but this seems to me to be wholly owing to the dearth of recommendations sent in from the O.C. here at the front. If I can get a chance to see and have a talk with the new colonel I think I can let him into the light on this subject and several others. Men like Regimental Sgt.-Major Roy Ferguson, Sgts. Hicks, Cyril Duley, and Leonard Stick and others whom I noticed on board the transport yesterday are miles ahead of some of the recent appointees. If I had a roll-call by me I could mention many others all of whom would come ahead of several of those appointed at the depot.

There is nothing like the front to try out men. There have been some startling disappointments but many more startling and pleasant surprises in this trial by fire.

I send, in addition to the copy enclosed a copy of the paper under separate cover so that you may have a double chance of receiving the article.

Major Oluny Macpherson has rendered valuable services to the Anti-Gas Committee. (Being in France at the time of the first gas attack, Major Macpherson suggested to the authorities at General Headquarters the substitution of a protective helmet made of flannel provided with a transparent window for the respirator of cotton waste, devised by Dr. John Haldane and Professor H.B. Baker, already in use. A helmet was made, and after it had been impregnated with suitable chemicals, suggested by Professor H.B. Baker, it was tested in chlorine gas and found to give good protection. Helmets of this type were then made and used for a few weeks with good results. Later developments in gas warfare caused the flannel helmet to be abandoned; but there is no doubt that Major Macpherson's suggestion was of great assistance to the troops during a critical period.

Later, Major Macpherson proceeded to the Dardanelles and gave lectures, often under shell fire, to the troops on anti-gas measures. He also established a station at Mudros for reimpregnating helmets after use in gas. After the evacuation of Mudros he rendered similar services in Egypt and then visited Salonica, where he also gave lectures to the troops on recent developments in the methods of protection against gas.

My dear Macpherson,

Many thanks for your exceedingly interesting letter of March 8th from Egypt. There is no other who gives me sensible indications of what is going on with such skill as you do.

Ever since I realised (in Feb.) that Colonel Hadow meant to smarten up his Battalion, I have been expecting trouble here from the rash grumbling of the men who do not understand that efficiency can never be reached without hard work. No one enjoys the Status proliaris and every teacher has to wisely vary the subject of the to prevent boredom. And that applies specially when teaching men who have never had the habits of discipline which grow with an old settled country. America generally is too new and "Liberty Equality Fraternity" and the ideal of democracy is impossible of real achievement.

I wish I were there to temper the acerbity of the training. The Officers are personally loyal to their Chief but they are young and inexperienced and timid of taking the work off the C.O.'s shoulders. The really good Company Officer never sends up his men to the Colonel because he knows the Regulations and when to ignore them. These young Officers may be frightened of overstepping their rights and being let down through an honest mistake.

I have received a list of 23 men who claim
their

their discharge. One of them sent his mother a letter which reached me. It was a tissue of misrepresentations and I am glad that his desire to have it published in the local Press has not been acted upon. None of the shirkers who have returned have stayed in the country. It has been too hot for them. And these men when they return will get a chilly reception.

A batch of 19 invalids are due shortly at St. John N.B. Capt. L. Paterson has gone to meet them and we mean to do them well on arrival. I think that they are all deserving of a warm welcome.

Recruiting is very good: we sent a draft of 157 which arrived at Ayr today, to complete H. Co. and we have 300 more ready in Barracks for a new Company to leave at the end of April. We shall send 300 or so monthly now for several months.

You will be pleased to know that H. Outerbridge has resigned his Hon. rank as Capt. & Quartermaster and has received a Commission as a Second Lieutenant for active service. Norman Outerbridge also wishes to join: I have advised him to join an O.T.C. in England and thus qualify for a Commission with our Regiment.

I enclose copy of a letter (June 20th) from Dr. Cluny Macpherson of St. John's to whom I lately gave letters of introduction to Mr. Lambert and Mr. Butler and of whose movements Mr. Batterbee is fully informed.

Dr. Macpherson who is a Physician and Surgeon with a large general practice in St. John's has devoted his leisure to St. John Ambulance work and is a Knight of Grace in the Order. When the war broke out he received my Commission as Captain and C.M.O. for the Newfoundland Regiment. I consider him a most able and public spirited man.

He left for London on March 17th (in lieu of taking his annual holiday which he devotes to following a clinic in Canada or the States), in the hope that he might see Hospital work at the front.

The result has been that he is now engaged on duties at the War Office, has been sent on five special missions to France and I understand is also to be sent to the Dardanelles. He has invented the type of anti-chlorine helmet which has been adopted for the British Expeditionary Force and, I understand by the French forces as well. Meanwhile, his practice which I have ascertained to be worth \$7,000 a year has naturally passed into other hands. No doubt, he will recover it later but the result so far has been heavy pecuniary loss.

I have spoken to his wife (who has lately returned from England)- a most capable woman and a zealous worker- and she tells me, confidentially, that they carry along on their private means and that her husband would prefer a decoration and promotion (temporary) in the R.A.M.C. to a monetary reward.

If his services have been so conspicuously useful as I gather from other sources, he appears to me to be deserving of recognition. To what degree, I cannot say; but will you, as the tutelary deity of our Newfoundland Regiment, watch his interest on my behalf?

A C.B. and promotion to be temporary Major R.A.M.C would be the prize which he most would covet, I think.

The helmet follows the design which he used on the Labrador when he worked on the Grenfell Mission and which we use for salmon fishing: and the idea of adopting the non-inflammable talc which is used by operatives in Cinema works he picked up through miscellaneous reading.

I wish to thank you very much for your kind words of congratulation and encouragement.

I have not words to express the appreciation I feel of the very great

Courtesy and kindness with which I have been treated by the staff here in the War Office. Red tape has been almost banished and I have not once run across an officer in the War Office who has made any difference because of his rank — and that in spite of the fact that nearly all my work is done with Generals, Colonels, and Lt-Colonels, and in nearly a dozen different departments besides the Medical.

A formal order has now been issued that the helmet of my pattern is to supersede the Respirator which were issued because they could be so much more speedily manufactured.

The order is that every man in all ranks is to have two on his person, one at his regimental depot and one at the ordnance base. Four for each man!

I have asked for and obtained Sgt. M. J. Murphy of ours, a druggist of some years experience at

"They have had to vary the helmet a little to meet some new German gasses, but the principle of an even permeability through the total impregnated covering, which is what I devised, still remains the same. One of the new gasses attacks the film and renders it opaque, therefore we have glass eyes. We were working very hard to perfect this before I left London, and I think my friend Lucas managed it. Then there has had to be a new solution to meet these new gasses, and this requires a chemical which would be quickly used up by the carbonic acid gas in the breath - so we now have a tube to breathe out through a valve preventing breath entering that way. Lastly we have to use flannelette as wool is attacked by the new solution. You will remember I had it worked out before you left that flannelette was as efficient as wool, but of course for not so long.

I wonder how long my old helmet will stand - five months tonight since I devised it - or shall I say "enunciated the principle on which it is founded." It is hardly to be supposed that something better will not be discovered before long - as a matter of fact they are working tremendously on something altogether different which they have not been able to make practical yet."

Dear Sir Walter:

Your letter of January 17th arrived last week and I have put off answering it as I hoped to be able to see the Regt. before doing so.

I have to again thank you, Sir, for your many kind words of encouragement and cheer, as well as for your kindness to my Sister and small son in giving them introductions to your friend in Jamaica.

I have just returned from a visit to "Ours" at Suez. I went there to lecture to the 29th Division on the eve of their departure. I had very large and attentive audiences for my four lectures, one for each brigade and one for Divisional R.Es. All Officers, Warrant officers, and Co.Sgt-Majors had to attend, and the subject was the training of the men in protecting themselves against poisonous gasses.

I am glad that I still have to show the helmet as the official protector - all other forms are absolutely forbidden - though I should have no cause to feel jealous if something better were discovered, now that it has held its place for over ten months. There are many of us working to find something better.

Yesterday and the day before I had lunch with "Ours", and I know you will consider it as personally CONFIDENTIAL if I give you a little idea of how things are with them.

The officers seem very cheerful and happy, and are very much pleased with their new O.C., Col. Hadow. The men, on the other hand, while quite as happy and

cheerful as usual, are not so taken with him, and this is not to be wondered at for various reasons which depend far more on circumstances than upon the O.C. You will have learned before this how slack things got to be under the former O.C. This is not so any longer, and while ^{"Ours"} could hold their own, and a bit more, with the rest of the Division on the Peninsula, it is a different thing in camp - with no fighting to do. The O.C. gives them plenty of work and is doing his best to get them well disciplined, fully realizing how very necessary this is, much more so in France than in Gallipoli. I can see that the O.C. is nearly distracted with them, but, as I pointed out to him, he has this one regiment of Colonials set down in a division of British regulars and naturally they would suffer under present conditions by comparison; that were they in a division of the new armies it would be a different tale. I also pointed out to him that the knowledge that he had a regiment behind him who would follow him anywhere and any detachment of which he knew would face any odds he cared to give them was a knowledge for which many a commander he knew would gladly take on all the troubles he was encountering. Further, while it would have been comparatively easy to train them last year it is now much harder and galling, because the men having been in the fighting consider themselves veterans. Their heads are perhaps a little swollen with the things that have been said and written of their work on the Peninsula - quite well deserved, all of them - add to this the lassitude they naturally feel in this climate, and you will, I feel sure, understand that they do not feel altogether

kindly towards the O.C. whom they think the cause of the new order of things. And they are not gifted with sufficient foresight to see that it is all for their good, nor with sufficient memory to remember the more disagreeable parts of the old regime. They were planning some sort of Brigade ceremonial for to-day. In England that would have ended, at least for the officers and those of the men who knew much about it, in mortification. I heard it on every side when I came over last year. In to-day's show they will do ever so much better, but, being with regulars, they will probably show up badly in drill (physically they are away ahead of any other battalion in the Division) the O.C. may be sore, and may say so forcibly, which will come as a shock to the boys who, with an outlook which my wife will tell you is very characteristic of Newfoundlanders, will probably come in with a "Didn't we do fine?" attitude. The situation was not helped by the late O.C. being around among details at the bases a good deal while trying to find out what he was to do; he was wont to show a bonhomie among them that I saw no sign of at Edinburgh!

I see I have been writing a lot on this subject and must warn you against thinking that it warrants so much attention. It does not. But then letters will go home telling of this feeling and magnifying it and therefore I have tried to show you both sides of it, and my own conclusion is the same as that of the officer in the regt. who is most intimate with the O.C. "Give them fighting to do and there's nothing better than they are, and the O.C. will soon forget all about these little camp troubles."

As for the O.C. he is a splendid type of soldier, keen, active, alert, a trifle hot-tempered I dare say, but his whole aim and wish is the efficiency of the Regiment.

The officers, especially those who served as such under the former O.C. have quite a different life. Things are well ordered, business is put thru promptly and properly; they have an O.C. who is thoroughly modern and "on to his job", and naturally they think very highly indeed of him.

I was mortified and ashamed by one scene which I witnessed. That was a parade of those who had refused to sign on for the period of the War and whose term was about up. Had the squad consisted of some of the older and married men of the battalion one would not have minded, but the group was made up of a number of young fellows who, an officer told me, were frequent visitors at Defaulters' Parade. The O.C. talked very seriously with them and, failing to change them, told them they were a disgrace to the Division, to the Brigade, to the Regiment, and to Newfoundland. He said everything he could to them and possibly some may change but it is certain that no one of them that has a spark of manhood in him will refuse to sign again. These men are nearly all from the last draft sent out, and reached Gallipoli shortly before the evacuation, some not at all. Why they were allowed to come out at all from the depot without first signing on I cannot think.

I am bothering you with all this, Sir, because you will see, I know, how the lionizing of these men on their return to Newfoundland will look to those who have

stayed to do their duty. It is hard I know to judge. But reading of one of their number posing as a hero at home, making a speech on his first impressions in the trenches, and taking a prominent part in some public occasion is galling when one puts it up against this same man's record out here which, as far as I can gather, is as follows:- When the first shell came over on the morning the battalion landed at Suvla this man, and this man only, bolted away from the Regt. to some cover. He was never near the firing line, he was sent back with the first batch of wounded. I asked how he managed that and was answered that he shammed crazy. He was some time in Alexandria, where, so the wounded who were there with him say, the doctor told him his was a sure case of "cold feet", and he was finally sent home as a case of shattered nerves. I do not blame any man for having his nerves shattered by the reception that "Ours" got on the Peninsula: a man of an imaginative turn of mind has a veritable hell to undergo. He would probably never have heard of it again had he not sought to pose as a veteran and hero.

Theoretically I know I am all wrong about these time-expired men. They made a contract, they have fulfilled it, and they do not wish to renew it. But that contract was made under the mistaken impression on the part of those who drew it up that the War would be over before it had expired.

I see I have let myself go on this matter but a judicious hint from you to the Reception Committee will probably put the matter right if any of this bunch reach St. John's. I know the details you will regard

as confidential.

I had a good long chat with the M.O., Dr Frew. He is a fine, public-spirited chap, and takes a very real interest in the boys' welfare, and is thoroughly well liked by both officers and men. Before the War he was practising in S.Africa and was Secretary of the Mine Medical Officers' Association of the Rand. We are most fortunate in having him.

Hearing from our officers that your brother lived at Port Tewfik I rang him up on my return to my hotel to ask when it would be convenient for him to have me call. He pressed me to come out at once as they were dining in a half hour. Both Mrs Davidson and he were kindness itself to me. They insisted on my staying with them all night. Perhaps the memory of the previous night spent on a table in Hotel du Sinai where I arrived at 1 a.m. made persuasion easy. I cannot half thank them for their warm hospitality. In the morning Mr and Mrs Davidson motored me up to the Camp. You will be glad to know that they are both looking in the best of health.

I have read your letter to Genl. Parsons and hope that you have had an answer to it long before this and in the affirmative.

You speak of the circumstances under which the new O.C. was appointed. The G.O.C. came round as usual one morning, and the only officer able to take him round the lines was Lieut. Frew, the R.M.O. The General sent round the new O.C. the next morning and

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again the R.M.O. was the only officer on his legs to show him round.

What a thousand pities that the sectarian cry was raised in St. John's, never, I think, with less justification. I'll just quote from a letter received a week or so ago from a ^{Roman} Catholic in the Regt. He says "Spouse you have heard of all the latest Comms. Summers, Edens, Power, Irvine, and others. Everyone here thinks it an awful farce."

May I ask you, Sir, to convey to Lady Davidson my warmest congratulations on her brother's splendid promotion. 2/Lt. Murphy's case has been dealt with in precisely the same manner as any other Newfoundland officer. An account was opened for him with the Bank of Montreal, Waterloo Place, his kit allowance, pay, etc., deposited on 26/5/16, of which he was duly advised. Payments have been continued every pay period and acquittance rolls have been presented for repayments from time to time.

From a letter received from Mr. Murphy it would appear that one of my letters did not reach him, but it was posted nevertheless.

When it was known here that this Officer had experienced some difficulty in drawing his pay, the matter was taken up with the Field Cashier and a further letter was received from Mr. Murphy stating that the difficulties had been overcome.



Burden who were discharging, to the general satisfaction, the Regimental duties which had been assigned to them.}

The duties of the Director of Medical Services are of an advisory character, with special reference to relations with the Army Council and the Regimental unit on Active Service, and any official correspondence with ^{on medical subjects} Dominion Forces.

It was intended also that the special experience acquired by Surgeon Major Cluny Macpherson on Active Service should be utilized for the benefit of the Newfoundland Regt. and for the guidance of those in authority: ~~it was hoped that the knowledge of medical administration gained by him in active service would be~~

The Director of Medical Services receives no ^{his appointment} emoluments, and constitutes no charge on any Government or Military fund, Surgeon Major Cluny Macpherson having voluntarily waived any claim to Regimental Pay while rendering such service.

The constitution of the Medical Board is a matter within the province of the Pensions & Disabilities Board, and is being evolved on the lines which are found locally to be most convenient, subject to ratification from time to time at ^{the concurrence of the} General Meetings of the Newfoundland Patriotic Association.

It was manifest that the Medical Board, which has specific, onerous, and highly responsible duties to perform, should have reasonable provision made by the Pensions & Disabilities Board, with the sanction of the Finance Committee, on account of ~~the~~ ^{its} office administration, the custody of its records, and the conduct of its correspondence.

The Officer commanding Headquarters and the Director of Medical Services meet the ^{General} Colonel commanding the Regiment, ~~who is also~~ ^{and} Chairman of the Nfld. Patriotic Association, at a weekly conference on matters which concern the executive administration and discipline of the Regiment.

Emphasis is laid on the fact that these officers serve the Colony in an honorary capacity, and it is found convenient to hold informal conferences on matters which call for ~~Council~~, but such conferences involve no expenditure.

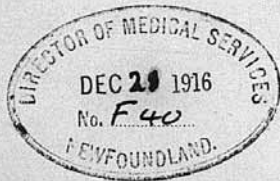

Dear Sir:

Little did I think when a year ago this month the Duke of Cornwall handed me my papers as a Knight-Hospitalier on Lord House Lawton that before the year was out I should be in what is surely the most appropriate place for a Knight-Hospitalier to be — on Turkish territory & fighting the Turks.

How ridiculous it would have seemed had anyone proffered such a thing.

We passed quite close to Malta too coming along on the Marmetania, but not close enough to distinguish the different buildings. I hope to look

2/ we have a cloudless sky & blazing sun. Fortunately we have a nice breeze as a rule. The salt water bathing is so delightful that all hands take advantage of it even though the beaches are favorite places for the Turks to drop their shells.

The first shell that I heard break exploded 10 yds behind me on ground I had that instant passed over. At my first lecture, the same afternoon, we were shelled out of the first place and moved elsewhere. There my remarks were punctuated by shells constantly breaking overhead.

In other places the gathering reminded me of scenes in the

3/ against a form of attack which might steel them at any moment. One day as I was returning from giving a lecture a high explosive shell from Asia passed close over my head and landed in a tent & gun-shot from my dug-out. Some sappers were having their lunch in the tent and it killed four & wounded five. I was just medical officer on the scene quickly followed by several others. Apart from the clearing my hospital, there are very few tents — a hundred I should think — tents on the Peninsular. Generals, officers, & men are all alike dug-in. Even the field ambulances are dug-in.

in there, when Surely the old spirit of the place is revived with every available space occupied with Christians sick & wounded in doing battle with the Turks.

I have had a week on the Gallipoli peninsula, my portion of our position being under shell fire & much of it under rifle fire also.

I lectured to officers of the whole force by Brigades sometimes giving as many as six lectures a day, which with the horse-back riding and walking between the different units made a very heavy day's work even in a cold climate. Out here

plays "Ino Vadis" & "The Sign of the Cross" where the Early Christians used to gather, two & three stealing in at a time from different directions & afterwards leaving in the same way. That was just the way the officers used to gather in the shade of a tree or hedge because had they in any way attracted the eye of the Turk - and we were in full view of him - we should have had plenty of shrapnel in among us. Never had any one more interested audiences, and you know it was no shotted pretence to fluency on my part but who could wish a more vitaly interesting subject on which to speak to these men than how to protect themselves

And it is generally conceded that the safest place on the whole Peninsula is the front trench, which are in many places so near the Turkish lines as to be practically immune from shell fire. — I gave one lecture only 150 yards from the firing line with rifles crackling on every side.

I hear the call of "out-light" now so cannot write more. I have just received your very kind letter of July 1st. I have left Sgt. M. J. Murphy of ours in charge of a station in France for resupplying noting the gas helmets after they have been used in gas. He is doing well. — With kind regards to Lady Davidson, I am



Reference:- Yours No.379/1 I cannot see how the enclosure helps the muddle in which I am landed. I am unable to draw even the Fifteen Pounds monthly that I hitherto could, and I have not been able to draw a single allowance since I left Newfoundland (unless a claim which I made out shortly before leaving London in December has been allowed.) This is a most unsatisfactory state of affairs for it forces me to pay my mess bills and all incidental expenses out of my pay, with no return. Bank of Montreal cheques too are not taken everywhere, and never without a good deal of bother and the loss of a piastre in the pound.

Where G.H.Q. is at present situated there is no bank, and to still further complicate matters I may be off to Salonika at any time.

I was given to understand that while our pay was still to come from Nfld. our Allowances were to come from Imperial funds. If that is right what I need seems to be an instruction to the Chief Paymaster, M.E.F. to make the-se payments to me. Please take the matter up at once: through the Colonial Office, I suppose, but do get it cleared up somehow.
