He states:— That whilst reconnoitring he was wounded in the head by a piece of shrapnel. He remained in the trench for about 12 hours and was then taken taken to a C.C.S. and remained there for 3 weeks. Whilst there he was dangerously ill suffering from compound comminuted fracture of skull with depressed inner table and was trephined. He was invalided to England on 25/3/17 and was in hospitals and on sick leave until 6/11/17 when he reported for light duty at Ayr and has continued on duty since.



I thought I would write to you about it, as you may be able to take steps which will avoid the same experience for others who may wish to consult specialists.

^{if} The train from ^{Truro} arrives at St. John on time -
^{there is} only one hour before the ^{other} train leaves for Boston. There is a most inconspicuous sign board in the Station over the Immigration Office, which I did not see. If I had seen it, it probably would have made no difference, as on the train there were other soldiers who 'knew the ropes' and who rushed for this Office and who were just able to get put through in time and they said there would have been no possibility of any more being handled.



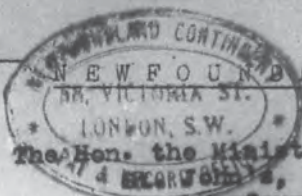



In connection with your desire to take passage on a transport, please attend here and pay for and receive your ocean ticket on Tuesday, June 25th, between the hours of 10 a.m., and 1 p.m., and between 2 p.m., and 5 p.m. At the time you call you will be able to purchase your rail ticket from the port of arrival, and you should therefore bring sufficient funds for that purpose. You will then be advised as to your baggage and the rail fare and train arrangements from London to the port of embarkation.

You must deliver up at the gangway all sugar cards and coupons and ration papers, or sign a written declaration which will be supplied to you at the gangway if not sent with your Passport.

This information is secret and confidential, and anyone divulging the same or mentioning the name or number of the steamer, is liable to penalty under the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and will be refused transportation.

Dear Herbert,

You wrote to Capt. Timewell on August 19 regarding a Webley-Frosbery revolver: he was going away for a holiday about then and so he left the matter in my hands. I went over to the Army & Navy Stores and did everything possible regarding it, but, alas, did not have it, for although it was still there it had been sold and paid for by a retired Colonel, after their post-card to you. I looked at the revolver carefully and was extremely sorry that it had been sold because it was in most excellent order. The only bright spot is that, although a deposit had been paid on it, the Army & Navy Society would not deliver it until a permit was obtained from the War Office, as he wanted it for a son of his who was a private and they are only allowed to sell revolvers to officers who are active. The matter is still open, as, if they do not hear from him during tomorrow, I have arranged that the revolver will be mine, they having given him two days' option on it: I very much fear that if it cannot be secured that chances of getting another in London are very small as I have enquired in several likely quarters and am informed that no revolvers of this sort are available at any price. As soon as I hear from the Stores I will let you know definitely what the position is. Regarding the holster I am leaving that in abeyance until I hear definitely about the revolver.

With regard to the prismatic compass: the pattern that I had is fairly easily obtainable, but they are rather delicate of action and it is questionable whether they are the best sort, so if you don't mind leaving this for a few days more I will find out all I can about them and if you can find time to drop me a line telling me to do the best I can in obtaining a prismatic compass, I will do so and have it sent to you.

I do hope that all is well with you and that the course is going strong. I feel sure that what you won't know at the end thereof will go into a very small volume.

The very nicest messages possible to Alice: I am looking forward so very much to seeing you both again.

Reference your letter 5/8/17: according to a ruling given by the D.D.M.S., London District 23/2/17, the regulations applying to Imperial Officers do not apply to Colonial Officers, hence it would appear that you would be on the same footing as Canadians or Australians, in which case it would appear necessary, unless you require further treatment, to release you from Hospital for the duration of your leave.

As a matter of fact, as you will be aware, the application of Regulations and Army Council Instructions to Newfoundland Officers is somewhat peculiar, in as much as arrangements for them are conducted by Imperial Authorities, whereas other Colonial Contingents have their own direct arrangements. I must confess that there has not been a precisely parallel case to yours, and on reference to the War Office Department concerned, I have been referred to A.C.I. 423/1917, and it is suggested that your case should be specially quoted, whereupon a written ruling may be obtained.

Meanwhile it is hoped that this letter may be sufficient.
