Enlisted April 14th 1915.

Reported April 24th that wife was ill and had five days leave rail order

Returned reporting wife O.K. Attached next is letter from wife dated

May 9th/15 in which it is stated " He can please himself about going to fight for his King etc.

Williams was paid \$25.00 on May 1st .

Next (2) is a letter from Mrs. Williams dated May 18th /15 also Telegram

May 20th/15. For some days previous to this period Williams had been

Behaving in an unsatisfactory Manner reporting sickness. The Medical Officer

could find nothing wrong with him. He came in and wished to be discharged

Finally about 18th Inst. he refused to drill saying he was not well.

Being paraded before the Adjutant he claimed to be in a state of collapse

and begged for mercy meaning that he wished to be discharged. It was

evident that the man was maligning and he was ordered back to the ranks

The M.O. again examined him and reported him to be alright.

The telegram came from his wife after other efforts had failed and in view

of her letter of May 9th. suggests collusion. It is apparent that the

man being out of work enlisted and was provided for . Now when the fishing

is beginning he wishes to get out. If his wife and family were provided

for I would recommend he be not discharged. There was due him up to May 14

\$24.60¢ He owes board at the Seamans Inst. \$16.22¢ I have held his final

balance back till it was decided what to do with him.

In any case some of it should go to his wife.

I await your instructions.
